## HOW MUCH DOES UNTREATED MENTAL ILLNESS COST INDIANA?

1 in 5 people in the US will experience mental illness each year, but the majority will not receive treatment (NIMH, 2023; SAMHSA, 2021). A lack of treatment is associated with reduced quality of life, productivity losses, worsening overall health, unemployment, and justice system involvement (NIMH, 2023; GAO, 2019).

A recent study from Indiana University Center for Health Policy researchers, Dr. Heather Taylor, Dr. Nir Menachemi, Amy Gilbert, JD, MPH, Jay Chaudhary, JD, and Dr. Justin Blackburn, focused on both direct and indirect costs attributable to untreated mental illness in Indiana in 2019<sup>1</sup>. The study utilized the US National Survey on Drug Use and Health, the National Survey of Children's Health, Indiana government sources, and Indiana Medicaid enrollment and claims data to estimate the annual cost of untreated mental illness among Hoosiers.

Societal costs measured in the study included direct nonhealth care costs (justice system involvement, homeless shelters), indirect costs (unemployment, workplace productivity losses due to absenteeism and presenteeism, all-cause mortality, suicide, caregiver direct healthcare, caregiver productivity losses, and missed primary education), and direct health care costs (disease-related health expenditures). The table below details the costs to Indiana residents annually. Mental illness is separated into two categories: serious and other. Serious mental illness disrupts a person's daily life and affects their ability to function (e.g. schizophrenia) while other mental illness is less severe but may still affect the individual (e.g. anxiety).

In total, the economic burden of untreated mental illness in Indiana was \$4.2 billion annually. The study findings suggest the financial toll of untreated mental illness at the societal level is substantial and warrants investments in mental health care access, treatments, and workforce. In Indiana, this work has already been used to support the passing of Indiana Senate Bill 1 – Behavioral health matters (2023 session) which seeks to expand community mental health services demonstration programs, create a "9-8-8" crisis response center and line, and establish the Indiana Behavioral health commission. Beyond Indiana, this research outlined a framework to estimate costs associated with untreated mental illness which can be used by other states to generate data for more informed decision-making with local stakeholders and policymakers.
